| Description           | A multitude of contradictions and complications exist within the music industry. According<br>to the Recording Industry Association of America, music revenues in 2016 were the highest<br>they've been in over eight years with the largest year-over-year percentage increase in over 18<br>years. However, these numbers do not reflect the tumultuous waters in which those connected<br>to the music industry find themselves today. While streaming services have increased<br>accessibility, the issues of piracy and artist control are of grave concern.<br>This course will examine how the record labels and publishers are responding to the changing<br>economy of the music industry. Discussions will address the big players in the music industry<br>(Sony Music, Universal Music, Warner Music Group, Sony Publishing, & UMPG) as well as<br>indie record labels' business strategy, how legal aspects of the music industry effect artists,<br>publishers, and consumers (digital rights management, etc.), as well as the ever-increasing<br>reliance on streaming and the technical companies providing music services. Topics to be<br>examined include copyright law, label and publishing agreements with artists, and backend<br>monetization of assets |  |  |
